2023 ANNUAL REPORT

What a year it was! With your help, we continued to fulfill our mission to reduce hunger in College Park and the surrounding neighborhoods. Your donations, volunteership, and neighborliness have made a real difference. In 2023 we filled 17,593 household requests for food, more than any previous year, impacting a record 69,285 individuals. This was only possible because of your support – you are a critical part of the "we".

Unfortunately, the difficult times continue for many families. The <u>2023 Capital Area Food Bank Hunger</u> <u>Report</u> reveals that 45% of Prince George's County residents are food insecure. This statistic shows how dire the need is and is consistent with what we observe every Saturday morning when we distribute food. There is always a long line of visitors waiting for us to open. Many of them come every week. They are old and young, students and retirees, long-time residents and new to the area, foreign-language speakers and English speakers. Some are underemployed, some live in multigenerational houses, and some live alone. One visitor described her efforts to help her own neighbors with the food she receives from the Food Bank. Without fail, they all express gratitude for our help.

The College Park Community Food Bank is committed to filling the pantries of our neighbors for as long as there is a need. Consider your role in our community! Here are four easy ways to help:


Our Mission

We work to reduce hunger in College Park and the surrounding communities by regularly offering healthy food to individuals and families.




Our Impact

15 ways to reduce hunger

In January we kicked off our 15th

anniversary with a challenge to our

community to support our mission to

reduce hunger fifteen different ways.





Seedlings distribution

In May we gave away more than 200 donated seedlings, including Chinese long beans, tomatoes, cucumbers, and peppers, as well as herbs such as basil, sage, and mint.



Hybrid bags distribution

In September we changed our distribution schedule to provide both fresh produce and nonperishables every week, rather than one or the other, to better address our visitors' nutritional needs.



Thanksgiving distribution On the Saturday before Thanksgiving, we distributed turkeys, chickens, stuffing, and other seasonal food to a record 541 families.

Our Initiatives



Produce packaging In February we switched to buying bulk produce rather than pre-assembled boxes to keep costs flat and launched Friday produce packaging opportunities for volunteers.



Foodraising Committee

In March we launched our Foodraising Committee to ensure the nutritional value of our distributed food, investigate sources for fresh produce donations, champion food drives, and monitor food costs.





Local farm partners and gleaning

During the growing season we engaged with local farmers who donated produce or allowed gleaning, to bolster our volume of fresh, healthy food for distribution.



Holiday distribution On the Saturday before Christmas, we distributed chickens and other seasonal food to 422 families.

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Our Events

Events throughout the year engage the community in different ways and provide us with the resources needed to reduce hunger.

Celebrating **College Park parade**

In May we participated in the College Park parade. Volunteers distributed citrus fruit and Food Bank information to spectators.

School supply giveaway

In August we gave away 230 bags of school supplies to families with schoolaged children to provide relief to tight family budgets!

College Park Day In October we talked with individuals

about our mission, operations, and ways to support our efforts. We also gave out citrus fruit!

Turkey donation drive

For the fourth straight year, our turkey donation drive allowed the community to provide poultry for visitors' Thanksgivings. Community members donated 138 turkeys and chickens!

Giving Tuesday donation drive We raised \$4,784.30 from 22 individuals, to help fund our holiday food distribution.




